



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
Having Difficult Conversations















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Why it is important to have difficult conversations on race at home:

- Starting the conversation about race and racism will help your child learn about what is happening around them, promote tolerance and respect from an early age, and encourage open dialogue.
- Recognize and celebrate racial similarities and aitterences.
- Promote diversity, curiosity, and understanding.
- Prevents the perpetuation of stereotypes.
